



The 5 Elements of Science Fiction

- Futuristic/Alternate History Setting.
- Advance technology (grounded in science).
- The "Alien" or "Other".
- Makes a serious comment about our world.
- **Often contains a warning for humankind.**



THE 9 SUB-GENRES OF SCIENCE FICTION:

Cyberpunk - Combines cybernetics and punk, usually near-future dystopian setting. (*The Matrix*)

Time Travel - A character travels to the past or the future.

(Time Machine by H.G. Wells)

Alternate History - Stories based on the premise that historical events might have turned out differently.

(Iron Skies movie 2013)

Military - Set in the context of conflict between national, interplanetary, or interstellar armed forces; the primary viewpoint characters are usually soldiers

(Starship Troopers by Robert Heinlein).



THE 9 SUB-GENRES OF SCIENCE FICTION:



Apocalyptic - Concerned with the end of civilization through war, pandemic, astronomic impact, ecological disaster, or with some world or civilization after such a disaster.

Space Opera - Adventure science fiction set in outer space or on distant planets. The conflict is heroic and typically on a large scale. (Star Wars by George Lucas)


Space Western - Transposes themes of the American Western books and film to a backdrop of futuristic space frontiers.

(Star Trek by Gene Roddenberry)

Superhuman - Stories deal with the emergence of humans who have abilities beyond the norm.

(Superman by Jerry Siegel and Joe Shuster)




To understand <u>Dystopia</u>, you must first understand <u>Utopia</u>

- A Utopia is a community or society possessing highly desirable or perfect qualities.
- Utopia does not, and has never, existed.
- The attempt to create an ideal society as portrayed in literature spawns <u>dystopia</u>.





Dystopian Literature

- * A <u>dystopia</u> is a community or society that is in some important way frightening or undesirable.
- Dystopias are the opposite of utopias.













The 3 Laws of Robotics

(according to Isaac Asimov)

- * A robot may not injure a human being or, through inaction, allow a human being to come to harm.
- * A robot must obey the orders given to it by human beings except where such orders would conflict with the First Law.
- * A robot must protect its own existence as long as such protection does not conflict with the First or Second Laws.







Voyager

- ★ Voyager I was launched by NASA in 1976 to conduct research on the outer solar system.
- ★ Carl Sagan helped develop probe and gold disc containing sounds and images selected to portray the diversity of life and culture on Earth, including the word "hello" spoken in every language on Earth.
- ★ Voyager I and its disc are meant to be a proverbial "message in a bottle" to any other intelligent life out there in the Universe.
- ★ The Voyager I space probe left our solar system and entered deep space in 2012.





- Published 1953
- A dystopian novel which presents a future American society where books are outlawed and firemen burn any house that contains them.
- Lexile Score = 890L / 10.0




ENDER'S GAME BY ORSON SCOTT CARD

- Published 1985
- A military dystopian novel which presents an imperiled humankind who have barely survived two conflicts with an insectoid alien species. In preparation for the 3rd conflict, children are bread as military geniuses.
- Lexile Score = 780L / 9.0




THE GIVER BY LOIS LOWRY


- Published 1993
- A dystopian novel that follows a child named Jonas through the twelfth year of his life and his decision whether to convert to "sameness" or to rebel and save the life of his little brother.
- Lexile Score = 760L / 6.0





DIVERGENT BY VERONICA ROTH

- Published 2011
- Set in Chicago in a dystopian future, society is divided into five factions, each dedicated to the cultivation of a particular virtue. On an appointed day of every year, all sixteen-year-olds must select the faction to which they will devote the rest of their lives.
- Lexile Score = 700L
